Kori Edmondson, Midfield, Severn (Md.), Maryland

The Terps have had several legendary midfielders don the Maryland jersey and Edmondson is poised to have a similar career in College Park. Edmondson is explosive and strong with the ball, creating shots from herself from a several different spots on the field. The No. 1 ranked recruit looks to make a splash in her final All-Star Game.

Shea Dolce, Goalie, Darien (Conn.), Boston College

No. 1-ranked goalie in the Class of 2022, Dolce looks to be the future anchor for the Eagles in the cage. Dolce has great height, anchoring any defense with her strong presence between the pipes. A strong communicator who sees the ball well is keen to make a major impact for Boston College.

Madison Beale, Defense, Ellicott City (Md.), Duke

The Baltimore Sun Player of the Year will look to lock down the high-powered attackers on the North side. Always looking to push the ball, Beale is a tactical and strong defender. She uses her size well in 1v1 matchups and can also handle the ball well to have an impact on the clear and in transition offense.

Emma Murphy, Midfield, Midland (Mich.), Notre Dame

Only the second Senior Game All-American from Michigan, Emma Murphy = high scoring. The Notre Dame commit holds the record for goals per game with 9.7 and 12.2 points per game. The 3x first team All-State midfielder recorded 579 points in just three seasons at H.H. Dow. Look for Murphy to push the ball and light up the net.

Carli Fleisher, Attack, Boca Raton (Fla.) Northwestern

The No. 10 recruit in the class of 2022 will thrive behind the cage and look to facilitate to the swarm of cutters to the goal. Fleisher will be crucial part of the offense if the South team can earn its 6th win of these games. She is a dynamic dodger and elite level finisher that will surely have an impact on the final score of the game.

12 IN A ROW: For the 12th consecutive year an All-America alum captured the women's Tewaaron Award, which is given out annually to the nation's top college lacrosse player. Boston College's Charlotte North took home the coveted award for the second straight year thanks in part to her 115-point season. She became the third All-American alumni to take home the Tewaaron Award multiple times.

SPREADING THE WEALTH: The All-America class of 2022 is headed to **20 different campuses** in the fall. University of Maryland and University of North Carolina lead the nation with six All-America recruits. Hofstra has its first Senior Game All-American since 2013 and Boston College has the most senior game recruits in program history (5).

I-A-A-M-AZING: The IAAM Conference proves itself as one of the best lacrosse conferences in the country with eleven All-Americans coming from the A-Conference. Notre Dame Prep (Marshall, Rockstroh, Barger, Peek), McDonogh (Smith, Edmondson, Godine), Glenelg Country School (Marszal, Weisman), and St. Paul's School for Girls (Beale and Steer).

HEAR-HER-ROAR: Clemson University will begin its inaugural season this spring and have already landed their first Senior Game All-American before taking the field. Paris Masaracchia will head south to anchor the defense for the Tigers and proven head coach Allison Kwolek.

BIG BLUE ON THE RISE: The University of Michigan has landed three Senior Game All-Americans – the most in program history. Ceci Stein, Peyton Shreves, and Rylee Tinney, all will head to Ann Arbor to build on the team’s success in 2022, earning a NCAA Tournament win for the second time in program history.

RICH GET RICHER: The University of Maryland has six All-Americans headed to College Park next year. Since the inception of the event, the 11-time National Champions have the most All-American commits with 80. Defending National Champion North Carolina has the second most with 70 All-American commits.

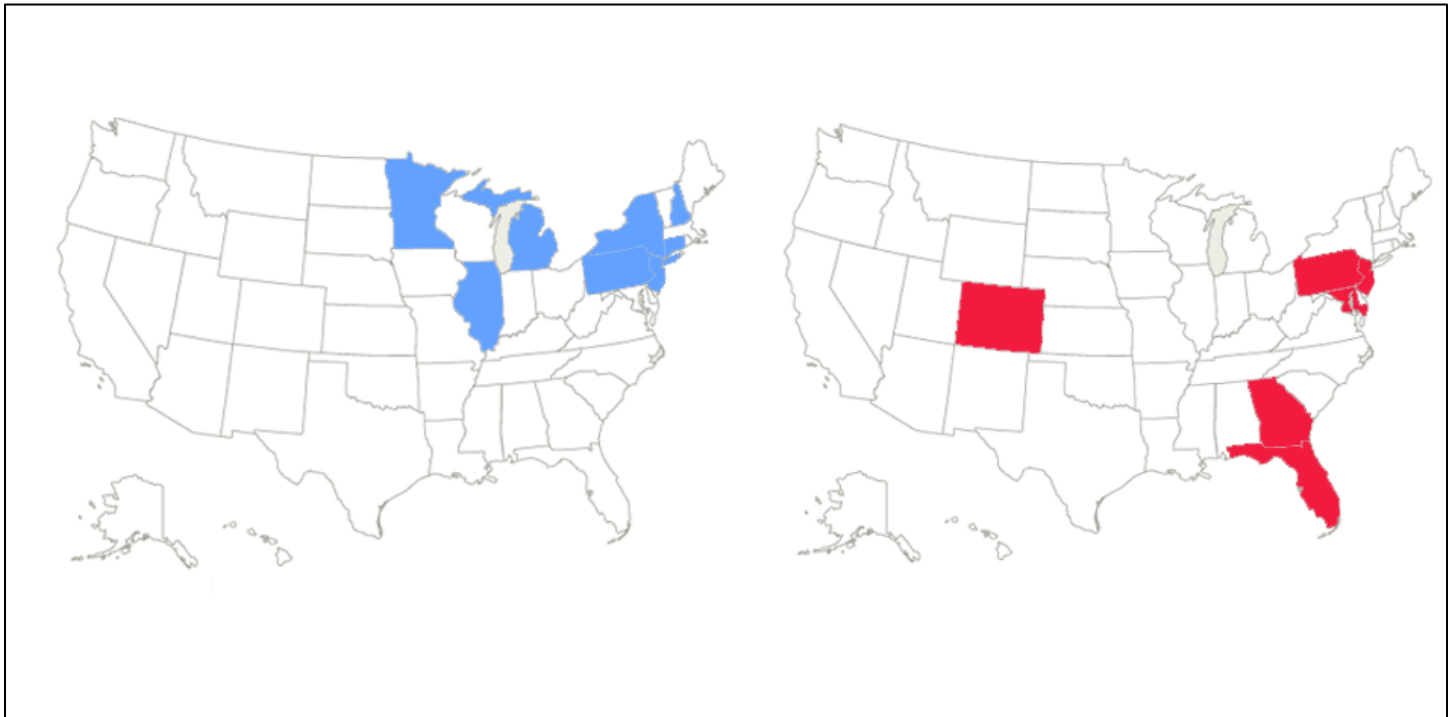
ALL-AMERICAN FAMILY: Kaleigh Harden, the USA Lacrosse Northeast Girls’ Player of the Year, will attend the University of North Carolina next year and reunite with her sister, McKenna, who was a 2021 Senior Game All-American. The Harden sisters chose the Tar Heels to follow in the footsteps of their father and two uncles, who earned All-American honors at North Carolina.
